

Collection is also necessary to meet the basic needs of the People of God still living in this Land where the Church was born.


When you contribute to the Pontifical Good Friday Collection, you become an instrument of peace and join with Catholics around the world in solidarity with the Church in the Holy Land.

The oratory committee (former parish council) will meet every 6-12 months to discuss all matters pertaining to the property. At this point, since IC will be maintained as an oratory, occasional prayer services, Masses, funerals and weddings may take place there. # From The Pastor

## The Makings of a Holy Week

I still remember asking myself the question: “Why have I been in church seven days this week?” It was something I had never asked myself before, and I was surprised by my answer: “Actually, it’s not that bad!” I was in high school, and this was my first year as a member of the church choir. I never realized how intricately detailed each celebration was, nor did I appreciate its fullness by the end of that one week. What I did know was that the Gospel had come to life.

Growing up, I had a hard time understanding why anyone would want to be in church more than one day a week. I could do that, but Wednesday nights were tough. So when Lent was coming to an end, I was surprised that I was enjoying the extra practices, getting ready for the extra celebrations of the Triduum: Holy Thursday, Good Friday and the Easter Vigil. I was surprised how moved I was by each of celebrations individually and as a whole. The Triduum unfolds in such a way that you can feel yourself a part of Jesus’ saving action.

On Holy Thursday, we look back at the Last Supper and its connection to service. As Jesus celebrated the Passover with his disciples, he gave us a new commandment and a source of nourishment: “Love one another, as I have loved you.” He loved the disciples by accompanying them, sharing his life and the message of the Kingdom of God. He nourished them by giving his Body and Blood, a sacrifice that would soon be completed. Join us as we re-experience the first Eucharist with the first priests, while Jesus also gives us the commandment of loving service.

Good Friday shows the depth of God’s love: “For God so loved the world that he gave his only son.” Growing up, it always seemed to rain on Good Friday. This always seemed very fitting to me. Even creation weeps at the death of Jesus. This day of fasting and prayer unites us to the death of Jesus. I encourage you to spend time in adoration of the cross this day, remembering that Jesus didn’t just die for all; he died for you.

Holy Saturday is a day of silence, of stillness. This day, the stone is firmly in place in front of the tomb. Hope has failed, and faith is hanging by a thread. God must still have a plan, right? Join us outside the church for our Liturgy of Light, showing that neither hope nor faith have been snuffed out. Listen to the Liturgy of the Word as the mystery of salvation is slowly unfolded. Then, we celebrate! We celebrate the resurrection, we celebrate new life in Baptism, we celebrate the Eucharist that we had witnessed in a special way just two nights earlier. This celebration will be long (I am guessing 2-2 ½ hours), but it is definitely worthwhile.

Ever since my first Holy Week as a member of the parish choir, I have grown in appreciation for all that this week is. If you have never taken part in the Triduum, make this the year. If you have been present, keep growing in realizing how profound Jesus’ actions are. This week is the core of our faith. Make this week a holy week.
