

with the help of Newman Centers and FOCUS missionaries. Please give generously to this year's Appeal.





CHRIST is our light!

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From our Pastor:

Over the past few years, I have learned to embrace the fact that I am no longer up to date on what younger people find interesting or cool. In particular, I am quite content to make bad jokes or use phrases that were in vogue ten years ago and watch them roll their eyes at me. Even so, there are some things that are passé that still hold value today. One specific phrase I remember being thrown around a lot that I haven't heard for a while is: "first-world problems."

First-world problems are things like having your phone die on you (because you forgot to charge it), or not being able to find your favorite cereal (and refusing to try out one of the 75 other options on the shelf), or spending 15 minutes surfing the web or channels (and not finding one thing to watch).

The current conflict in Ukraine is a reminder that perhaps our first-world problems can take a rest. As we watch people flee their homes, weep over the slain and resist a hostile takeover, perhaps we can all take stock of the blessings in our lives. Of course, the Ukraine is not the first time this has happened. You might think of hostile takeovers, violent regimes, genocidal attacks, or other forms of war that have and continue to take place around our world. Kuwait, Rwanda, Rohingya and Columbia are just a few of the peoples and places that have experienced violence in the past few decades. While I can say with many others "this must stop," I am also aware of the emptiness of those words. After all, who is listening?

Yet it is so important to say those words and mean them. This past week, some of our young people spent time in faith formation offering prayers for the people of the Ukraine. This is a vital action in solidarity. As we live not only as global citizens, but also as part of the family of God, it is good to remember that neither nation nor language nor skin color nor culture can separate us from the love of God, and they cannot give excuses to not love your neighbor.

As I have already mentioned, Lent is a time of conversion. This time should teach us to love God and neighbor better and in greater truth and reality. The violence in the Ukraine may not affect our daily lives directly, but it should indirectly cause us to look in the mirror to ask whether my words, actions and inactions are directed toward building peace and unity, or division and chaos.
