

RCIA: Those wanting to learn more about our faith or are interested in becoming full members in the Catholic Church please contact the Office.



Baby Bottle Campaign Supports

Alternatives to Abortion Financial concerns are cited as one of the common reasons why women have abortions. This makes our financial support for pregnant women vital for encouraging the choice for life. The 15th annual Baby Bottle Campaign is underway in churches and schools across the Diocese where you can take home a baby bottle and fill it with spare change throughout October. It may seem that one bottle of change won’t make an impact, but putting these bottles together will help many women choose adoption or parenting rather than abortion for their unborn child and give babies the best start possible. The Baby Bottle Campaign offers a two-fold purpose. First, all of the money collected will be used to assist women who are pregnant and need financial help. Financial grants may be given for rent, utilities, and other needs. Catholic Charities’ Social Workers also offer help and hope to those who feel in crisis with their pregnancy. Secondly, the campaign will raise awareness in the parishes concerning the day-to-day efforts on behalf of women in which Catholic Charities’ Pregnancy, Parenting, and Adoption program has been engaged in for over seventy five years! The Baby Bottle Campaign is a perfect project for providing individuals and families a chance to offer a real response to women choosing life over abortion.

From the Pastor

Please see the following statement regarding our Bankruptcy proceedings. We welcome this news as an important step in our responsibility toward all, and pray for the continued healing of all those affected by sexual abuse, especially within the Church.

The United States Bankruptcy Court for the District of Minnesota confirmed a Plan of Reorganization on Oct. 14, 2021, jointly submitted by the Diocese of Winona-Rochester and the Committee of Unsecured Creditors, who represent the survivors of sexual abuse. The Plan provides for a substantial trust to compensate survivors of sexual abuse within the Diocese. The trust will be funded with up to \$22,056,000 (less certain bankruptcy expenses) of Diocesan assets, which include the disposition of specific Diocesan assets, and insurance coverage settlements of \$6,500,000. The Plan also includes the implementation of enhanced non-monetary protocols for the protection of children which were first implemented by the Diocese in 2002. “I welcome today’s announcement. I want to express my sincere apology to all those who have been affected by sexual abuse in our Diocese,” Bishop John M. Quinn said. “My prayers go out to all survivors of abuse and I pledge my continuing commitment to ensure that this terrible chapter in the history of the Diocese of Winona-Rochester never happens again.” The Diocese of Winona-Rochester filed a voluntary petition for relief under Chapter 11 of the Bankruptcy Code on Nov. 30, 2018. Since then, the Diocese has worked toward an agreement with abuse survivors for a resolution of all sexual abuse claims against the Diocese and non-diocesan Catholic entities within the Diocese. The order confirming the Diocese’s Chapter 11 Plan of Reorganization is available on the Diocesan website at <https://www.dowr.org/reorganization/index.html>. This webpage includes other reorganization-related information, such as public statements, legal documents, a list of clergy credibly accused of abuse of minors, frequently asked questions, how to report abuse, and safe environment resources. “This Plan of Reorganization represents the culmination of several years of respectful negotiations among all the parties involved,” Bishop Quinn added. “It is our responsibility to assist survivors of sexual abuse with this financial settlement. In addition, we remain committed to the ongoing process of restorative justice. Jesus Christ started his ministry by healing others, and the Church is called to continue that ministry.”
