

Pastor’s Perspective: Our Lady of the Rosary

The Feast of Our Lady of the Rosary is on October 7. This celebration is the reason that October is sometimes known as the month of the Rosary. It seems fitting that this month coincides with “Respect Life Month,” as Mary became the mother of Life itself-Jesus. I encourage you to grow in a devotion to Mary through the Rosary, and to use this month as an opportunity to find a routine that will work well for you. I know for myself, I normally pray the Rosary during an early morning walk, or while I am driving. Perhaps this would be a time to learn how to pray with this time-tested method, individually or as a family.

The Rosary is thought to have been invented by St. Dominic around the 12th and 13th century. While it is not likely that he used the Rosary in the exact form we do today (there was some development and changes for the next few hundred years, and then Pope St. John Paul II added the Luminous Mysteries more recently), it does seem certain that he used it as a method of preaching the Gospel. In fact, sometimes the Rosary is referred to as a mini-Gospel because it invites us to reflect on the primary mysteries of the life of Jesus and Mary.

How do we do that? Praying the Rosary is one of those things that can be a bit clunky at first, but after a while it becomes natural. The focus of the Rosary is to use the Hail Mary’s as a rhythm of prayer while meditating on the mysteries of the life of Christ and His Mother. When thinking about the mysteries, you can consider what happened, why that is a gift, and to praise and thank God for working in our lives. The Rosary is also used as a method of intercessory prayer. I always offer the Rosary for a specific intention (or several), joining my prayer to Mary’s.

The Rosary is a beautiful gift, and I hope that you will renew your devotion, or add this devotion, to your prayer life. You will not be disappointed; Mary will always bring you closer to her Son and the gift of the Spirit!

Hail, holy Queen, Mother of mercy, our life, our sweetness, and our hope.
To thee do we cry, poor banished children of Eve.
To thee do we send up our sighs, mourning and weeping in this valley of tears.
Turn then, most gracious Advocate, thine eyes of mercy towards us.
And after this, our exile, show unto us the blessed fruit of thy womb, Jesus.
O clement, O loving, O sweet Virgin Mary.
Pray for us O Holy Mother of God,
That we may be made worthy of the promises of Christ. Amen.
